Moss - It's Growing on Us!


Mosses are often regarded as pests as they tend to replace grasses and take over lawns. However, mosses are actually beneficial having both ecological and aesthetic value. Ecologically, mosses act to control erosion and help retain moisture and nutrients in the soil. They are also a good bio-indicator of air and water pollution. They only thrive in areas that exhibit good air and water quality. Mosses are also one of the first plants to respond to acid rain; the decline in mosses (and other related plants, such as lichens) indicate a negative change in the environment.

Aesthetically, mosses add a natural beauty to the lawn and garden setting, typically filling in void spaces of soil where little else will grow. Mosses can brighten up a shady corner of your property as they are at their greenest in low light, unlike most grasses which need full sun to thrive. Moss may be the ideal plant under large, shady trees – providing low-maintenance year-round greenery. Mosses do well with most shade-loving shrubs and deciduous trees but may not hold up as well under conifers.

Growing or Controlling Moss...

Understanding what mosses need to grow is important for both promoting and controlling its growth. First of all, mosses do not compete with lawn grasses, they only occur when some underlying condition inhibits the growth of grasses and other plants. These conditions typically arise as a result of:

- ◆ Medium to dense shade.
- ◆ Poorly drained, persistently wet soils.
- ◆ Acidic soil conditions.
- ◆ Repeated “scalping” of turf on uneven terrain.
- ◆ Compacted soils.

Controlling Moss Growth

There are several steps you can take to prevent moss growth. The easiest is to simply prune surrounding trees and shrubs that shade your flowerbed and lawn. If the moss is not controlled using this technique it's likely a result of soil conditions. If you're unsure of your soil conditions you could get a soil test to evaluate your soil quality. Adjust your soil's fertility and pH based on the test's recommendations. If your flowerbed contains acid-loving plants such as rhododendrons and azaleas, you may not want to add lime to your soil

If you have compacted, poorly drained soil, dig in 1 to 2 inches of compost to improve the soil's fertility and ability to regulate moisture. You could also cover bare soil with 2 to 3 inches of bark chips to control moss where the moss grows.

But perhaps the best solution is to beat nature at her own game and, after amending the bare spots with compost, fill them in with groundcovers that complement your flowerbed design. Low-growing plants that perform well in shade include Miner's Lettuce (*Claytonia perfoliata*), Wood Strawberry (*Fragaria vesca*) and Bunchberry (*Cornus Canadensis*).

Why work against Mother Nature?

Chances are if the conditions are right for moss to grow, significant renovation may be required to get grass to thrive in the same area, with no guarantees... So instead of fighting it, you might want to consider helping the moss flourish.



Black Gold Rush Update

How does your compost measure up?

The Black Gold Rush Challenge is entering its final quarter and now is your chance to take part by logging on to the Black Gold Calculator and entering your compost tally (if you haven't already). All you need to do is estimate how much waste you've thrown into your compost bin in the past week, month or even year and use the calculator to find out your savings in green house gas emissions. For every kilogram of food waste we compost we are preventing an almost equal measure of green house gas emissions from entering out atmosphere. Imagine how that number can add up over time!
